### District & School Profile

Coachella Valley Unified School District covers more than 1,200 square miles of mostly rural desert terrain, serving the communities of Coachella, Thermal, Mecca, Oasis, Indio, and the Salton Sea. The district currently operates fourteen elementary schools, three middle schools, three comprehensive high schools, one continuation high school, and one adult school. Coachella Valley Unified School District has a growing reputation for innovative programs and outstanding staff.

Valley View Elementary School is located in the northern region of the district's boundaries and serves students in grades kindergarten through six following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2015-16 school year, 788 students were enrolled, including 5.7% students with disabilities, 67.1% English Language Learners, and 96.8% socioeconomically disadvantaged.

## Student Achievement

### Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Valley View Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in fifth grade. The physical fitness test measures each student's ability to complete six fitness tasks in six major areas. Students that either meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be physically fit or in the "healthy fitness zone." ### California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP)

California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) Tests assess student performance in English language arts/literacy and Mathematics in grades 3 through 8 and 11, and Science in grades five, eight and ten utilizing computer-adaptive tests and performance tasks. This system is based on the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and is part of the Smarter Balanced Assessment System.

The CAASPP results shown in this report include overall results comparing the school, district and state scores as well as the school's overall score in each applicable grade level and subgroup. Results are shown only for subgroups with ten students or more taking the exam. For those categories that are blank in the CAASPP tables, no students met subgroup criteria. **Federal Intervention Program**

The passage of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), reauthorizing the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) in December 2015, is part of the Federal Title I funding program designed to support additional staffing and programs to meet the needs of low-income, low achieving students, and other designated students with special needs. Schools may apply, based upon their student demographics, for one of two types of Title I funding: Title I Schoolwide or Title I Targeted Assistance. Title I Schoolwide schools use federal funds for schoolwide improvement of student achievement. Title I Targeted Assistance schools use federal funds to help those students who meet specific program criteria. In 2015-16, Valley View Elementary School qualified for Schoolwide Title I funding and is therefore subject to comply with Title I program requirements.

Any school receiving Title I funds is required to comply with respective program testing and reporting activities, achieve specific levels of student proficiency, and monitor school progress towards meeting established goals. Most of the new provisions under ESSA do not take effect until the 2017-18 school year making 2016-17 a transition year. **Classroom Environment**

**Discipline & Climate for Learning**

Valley View Elementary School's discipline policies are based upon a schoolwide discipline plan and PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Support), which are used as guides to develop school rules, develop behavior management programs, promote responsibility, promote respect, and minimize classroom disruptions.

The Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS) program provides comprehensive curriculum to promote responsible, safe behaviors as well as bully prevention strategies through classroom activities, presentations, hands-on activities, and scripted weekly lessons.

Teachers clearly identify and explain behavior expectations to their students and discuss consequences for poor or disruptive behavior in the classroom. The principal leads assemblies which address discipline policies and behavior expectations. Throughout the year, the principal meets with each grade level as a group to discuss students' roles as good citizens and the value of a good education.

Valley View Elementary School employs a progressive approach in managing students who make poor choices in behavior, do not follow school rules, or are disruptive in the classroom.

### Advancement Via Individual Determination

Valley View Elementary School implemented the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program during the 2015-16 school year for grades 5-6. The AVID program teaches skills and behaviors for academic success, provides intensive support with tutorials and strong student/teacher relationships, creates a positive peer group for students, and develops a sense of hope for personal achievement gained through hard work and determination. Valley View Elementary School is focused on the organizational and note-taking skills for the first year of implementation of this program.

### Class Size

The Class Size Distribution table in this report illustrates the distribution of class sizes by grade level, the average class size, and the number of classes that contain 1-20 students, 21-32 students, and 33 or more students.

## Curriculum & Instruction

### Staff Development

All training and curriculum development at Coachella Valley Unified School District revolves around the California Content Standards and Frameworks and National Common Core Standards. The district's Educational Services Division works closely with school administrators, teachers, and the superintendent to identify staff training needs based upon review of student performance data results, monthly site leadership collaboration efforts, and principal input.

Staff members build teaching skills and concepts through participation in conferences and workshops throughout the year. The district allows each teacher to participate in 15 hours of staff development time. Training activities typically relate to the teacher's area of expertise and covers innovative strategies and techniques to improve student achievement and the quality of classroom instruction. Teachers may participate in district-sponsored seminars presented by district personnel, outside consultants, and/or professional development organizations.

The district offers two distinct programs to support professional growth and improve instruction in the classroom. The Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment (BTSA) program offers support and assistance to newly credentialed teachers. All participating new teachers are provided peer support over a two-year period. The Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) program is available to veteran teachers who need to improve instructional skills, classroom management strategies, subject knowledge, and/or related aspects of their teaching performance. Experienced and knowledgeable veteran teachers, referred to as "coaches", are paired with teachers referred to the PAR program to provide individualized guidance, support, and training.

Classified staff receive job-related training from school administration and consultants. Special education aides received specialized training from district office personnel. Long-term substitute teachers are invited to attend designated training sessions.

### Site-Based Training

Valley View Elementary School works with the Coachella Valley Unified School District to focus on specific areas of study and to improve instructional practices, address areas needing improvement, and implement new programs for improved student learning. Through collaborative efforts of district representatives, the principal, and the school leadership team, specific areas for professional training are identified to complement and support districtwide training. Staff development needs correspond with classroom observations, student performance data, and feedback from grade level teams. During the 2015-16 school year, teacher training activities focused on:

Valley View Elementary School's staff members include one project facilitator who specializes in English Language Development, math, and language arts. The project facilitator takes a lead role in providing training and support to teaching staff.

### Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Valley View Elementary School are being aligned to the Common Core State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On September 13, 2016, the Coachella Valley Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 2017-16 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program, 3) sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes, and 4) laboratory science equipment was available for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2016-17 school year, Coachella Valley Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

## Professional Staff

### Support Services Staff

Valley View Elementary School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally.

The Support Services Staff table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Valley View Elementary School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

### Teacher Assignment

During the 2015-16 school year, Valley View Elementary School had 35 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects.

In the adjacent table, which identifies the number of classrooms taught and not taught by NCLB-compliant teachers, high poverty schools are those schools in the highest quartile for student participation defined by the free and reduced price meal program. Low poverty schools are those schools that are in the lowest quartile of program participation.

## School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Valley View Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1959; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff.

District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Every morning before school begins, the day custodian unlocks the school gates and inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Valley View Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Cafeteria Cleanup/Setup
- General Maintenance
- Restrooms

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Classrooms
- Restrooms
- Office Areas
- Afternoon/Evening Events Preparations

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

### Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the following individuals are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas, the breakfast area and playground: instructional aides, classified staff, noon supervisors, teachers, POPs, and crossing guards. During breaks, students are supervised by aides and yard duty supervisors. Yard supervisors and classified staff monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, teachers, crossing guards and support staff monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure. The principal assists with morning, lunch, and afternoon supervision of students.

Valley View Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

### School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Valley View Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed and updated in April 2016, and discussed with school staff in September 2016.

### Condition of Facilities - Riverside County Williams Inspection Results

On an annual basis, representatives from the Riverside County Office of Education visit Coachella Valley Unified School District's schools that are in the API Decile Ranks 1-3. The inspection is designed to evaluate and verify that school facilities conditions are in "good repair" and that any deficiencies are accurately reported in the School Accountability Report Cards. The most recent facility inspection for Valley View Elementary School completed by the county took place on November 10, 2016. Results of the inspection are provided in the table above.

## Salary & Budget Comparison
